The Apple that Made Lake Minnetonka Famous

Gideon's Glen Park, located on the west side of Highway 19 across from the Tonka Village Shopping Center, is part of what once was a 100-acre farm owned by Peter Gideon and is the location of where commercial apple farming

got its start in Minnesota.

Peter Gideon, like many early European settlers to Minnesota, tried to grow apples using seeds and seedlings from trees cultivated outside of the state, but the trees could not survive Minnesota's harsh winters. By 1861, according to his obituary, the nine members of the Gideon family were down to their last eight dollars, one cow, a few chickens, and a single surviving apple tree - a Siberian crabapple. Gideon sent the family's last dollars to an apple grower in Bangor,

Mr. Gideon crossed one of the trees with his remaining Siberian crabapple trees and by 1868, he introduced the first Minnesota hardy apple,

Maine, and received a

bushel of apple seeds

in return.

the Wealthy apple, named after his wife, Wealthy Gideon. By the early twentieth century, the Wealthy apple became one of the top five apples grown nationally and, for several decades, it

was one of the most profitable apples grown in the United States.

Mr. Gideon, a transcendentalist, claimed "an invisible being" came to him in a dream and told him where to buy the original seeds. But historical records indicate somewhat more mundanely that he received the advice from a successful Canadian horticulturist, Francis Peabody Sharp.

Mr. Gideon held many controversial beliefs for the time, including abolishing slavery, supporting women's rights and women's suffrage, and

the demoralizing effect of fast horses on society. He also did not think highly of beards; reportedly, he would call out men with beards because he

believed it was morally strengthening for a man to get up in the morning and shave.

Peter Gideon never made any money from the Wealthy apple.

From The Helm By Tom Frahm, LMA Board President



Lake Minnetonka 2023

This was an interesting and productive year on the lake. After a winter of lots of snow and a spring with a fair amount of rain, the lake level temporarily came up. Unfortunately, the summer was very dry, leaving water levels in the lake low. This created some challenges for the Bay Treatment Program, but thanks to our experienced applicator, the

Lake Minnetonka Association was able to treat nine bays for Eurasian watermilfoil and curlyleaf pondweed. I hope that 2024 will not be as challenging – but Mother Nature likes throwing curve balls!

The lake was treated for invasive flowering rush in 2021 and, as a result, there was not much of this invasive weed in 2022, but in 2023 flowering rush came back. We plan to treat the plant again in 2024 followed by hand pulling in some bays. We are hopeful we can stop it from spreading and maybe eliminate it all together.

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) monitoring using the Remote Inspection System at the Maxwell Bay boat access continued through fall of 2023. This year, boat traffic increased six-fold because of the reopening of the Maxwell Bay and North Arm Bay bridges. We learned a great deal about when and how many boaters used the access, types of boats launched, number of return users, etc. The most important thing we learned is most boaters are remembering to remove weeds from their boats before launching them. Also, the Lake Minnetonka Association partnered with Minnetonka Marina and Life's a Beach Shoreline Services to clean up Cruiser's Cove after the 4th of July. Every year we are finding less and less trash left behind – it is clear that more boaters are remembering to keep trash out of the lake.

This summer, the LMCD considered an ordinance to give them the authority to fine lakeshore homeowners \$300/day up to \$25,000 for any violation of their rules. After the Lake Minnetonka Association questioned the legality of the proposed ordinance, the LMCD Board decided not to adopt it. The Lake Minnetonka Association also joined the Hennepin County Sheriff's Office in opposition of a proposal by the LMCD to eliminate observer requirements for water skiing and wake sports. After some debate, the LMCD board voted to keep the observer requirements.

What's that Fish? Crappie

Crappies are members of the sunfish family and are desirable pan fish because of their taste and ease to catch. There are two species of crappie found in Lake Minnetonka, the black crappie and the white crappie, with black crappies being somewhat more abundant and widespread.

The record crappie reported in Minnesota was a 21-inch black crappie weighing five pounds. It was caught in the Vermillion River just south of the Twin Cities in 1940. Black crappies can live for 7-9 years, but most that are caught by anglers are 3-4 years old.



From the Sheriff's Office ICE SAFETY

In a few weeks, Lake Minnetonka will begin icing over. While early, smooth ice is inviting to skaters and ice-fishers, **no ice is safe.** If you head out on the ice, here are a few safety reminders from the Hennepin County Sheriff's Office:

- Never consider ice completely safe.
- · Never go onto ice alone.
- · Carry a set of ice rescue claws.
- Let someone know where you will be and when you plan to go home.
- Only walk on ice that is at least 4 inches thick.
- For skating, physically check the ice with a chisel or drill. Ice changes even within a few feet.
- If you break through the ice, try to stay calm. Turn around and get out the same direction you came from.
 Call 911 and seek warm, dry shelter.
- Avoid any place where water is moving under the ice such as in channels or under bridges.
- Check ice conditions with a local bait shop or call the Hennepin County Sheriff's Office: 612-596-9880.

CRITTER CORNER: MUSKRAT

While a muskrat is not a rat, they are cousins to a large family of rodents that include rats, mice, squirrels, beavers, porcupines, and hamsters. Muskrats are found throughout Minnesota and, along with its cousin the beaver, are the only mammals that actually build homes in the water. That is where they spend the winter and raise their young.

Muskrats are voracious eaters that are active year-round and can become a real nuisance to plants and small animal life living near waterbodies. If muskrats find your property to be a good source of food, they will be sure to try and make a home. Muskrats are known to chew on rubber hoses and wires on boats, which can cause damage and lead to costly repairs. They also burrow into shore banks, which can lead to shore bank erosion and damage to vegetation and rip rap.

Like most wild animals, muskrats will leave people and pets alone unless they feel threatened. However, when threatened, muskrats can be vicious and aggressive so it is wise not to engage them. If muskrats are a nuisance, it is best to contact a pest control specialist to remove them. Rodent repellants available in most home stores work well but need regular reapplication. Motion sensing sprinklers will also scare away muskrats.

Life Jacket Use

More drownings can be prevented if boaters wore a life jacket. This is especially important during the fall and spring when water temperatures are low and the possibility of drowning increases.

A recent nationwide study published by the US Coast Guard found the average life jacket wear rate in 2022 for all boaters on all types of boats except personal watercrafts* was 19.2% (*life jackets are required when operating a personal watercraft).

Minnesota Law Requires:

- Children under 10 years old to wear a properly fitted life jacket while a boat is underway. Underway means not securely fastened to a permanent mooring or tied to a dock.
- A readily accessible and wearable life jacket is required for each person onboard a boat, this includes canoes, kayaks, stand-up paddleboards, paddleboats and waterfowl boats.
- One Type IV throwable flotation device is required on boats 16 feet or longer (except canoes and kayaks) and must be immediately available.
- Personal watercraft operators and passengers must each wear a life jacket.

However, in 1878, he became a superintendent of the University of Minnesota's agricultural experiment station located near Excelsior. The station closed in 1889 following conflicts Mr. Gideon had with the University of Minnesota. Eight years later, in 1907, the Minnesota Legislature established a fruit-breeding farm located in part of what is now Victoria. The farm later became part of the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum and is the birthplace of many successful apple varieties sold worldwide - several of which originated from the Wealthy apple tree Peter Gideon raised on his farm over 155 years ago. Peter Gideon died on October 27, 1899.

Bay Treatment Program Update

In 2023, 74% of the funds for the Lake Minnetonka Association Bay Treatment Program came from property owners and businesses located on participating bays. Even though all of the property owners living on participating bays benefit from the treatments, on average, only about 30% of them contribute to the program.

While some property owners may feel the MnDNR, Minnehaha Creek Watershed District, or other government agency should pay more for weed control, the simple fact is they either do not have the interest or the ability to raise the funds needed. The Lake Minnetonka Association will continue to work with government agencies and others to find additional funding. Currently, bay treatments are funded primarily by the residents and businesses on each bay who contribute to the program. Without the continued support from property owners living on the participating bays, this program cannot continue and the weeds will return.

The Lake Minnetonka Association oversees the Bay Treatment Program, and the money collected is used solely for each bay's treatments (and does not generate revenue for the Association). Administrative costs (accounting, grant writing, administrative support, etc.) are billed back to the Bay Treatment Program, amounting to less than 2% of participant contributions.

Drought Impacts on Lake Minnetonka

According to the US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association (NOAA), 2023 was the 21st driest year in the last 129 years. The Lake Minnetonka area was recently upgraded from a "moderate drought" to "abnormally dry" and the lake level remains below average for this time of year.

Weather forecasters predict that El Niño weather patterns will continue through the spring of 2024, indicating a strong likelihood of above average winter temperatures. The low lake level, mild winter temperatures, and low snowfall could lead to early weed growth and algae blooms next spring. Curlyleaf pondweed grows particularly well during years with little snow cover and short "ice on" seasons.

It is too soon to predict when the current drought will end. Droughts in our area appear to cycle every 10 years. But their impact may remain well after "normal" conditions resume. Several soaking rainfalls over a long period would be the ideal way to recover from the current drought.

However, long-term weather patterns in the upper Midwest favor dry periods followed by short, intense thunderstorms. When this happens, most of the rain will run off into drainage channels and streams. This runoff can carry significant loads of sediment and pollutants that wash off from fields, lawns, streets, and parking lots.


Lake Minnetonka is entering winter in a precarious

place. The warm, dry conditions of this past year resulted in excessive weed and algae growth and lower oxygen levels, especially in coves and shallow areas. If the prediction of a mild winter without much snow is accurate, oxygen levels will continue to drop and will increase the possibility of fish kills next spring. This situation can become worse if the area experiences a rapid thaw or intense spring rain events.

While it is difficult to predict with any certainty what next spring will bring, if the past is any prediction of the future, Lake Minnetonka will recover from this year's drought and any challenges the coming winter or spring will bring.

Leading Causes of Fatalities and Accidents While Boating

The US Coast Guard's 2022 Recreational Boating Statistics show that the **top five** primary contributing factors in boating accidents are:

- · Operator inattention,
- · Operator inexperience,
- Improper lookout,
- Excessive speed,
- Machinery failure

Other findings included:

- 75% of fatal boating accident victims drowned. Of those, 85% were not wearing a life jacket.
- Three of every four boaters who drowned were using vessels less than 21 feet in length.
- Alcohol use is the leading known contributing factor in fatal boating accidents and was listed as the leading factor in 16% of deaths.
- 74% of deaths occurred on boats where the operator did not receive boating safety instruction.
